# President's Notes

Kimberly W. Peachy, NCTM, VMTA State President

Approximate the season and are looking forward to a productive 2005. I attended the 2004 MTNA Summit for Leadership in Cincinnati, Ohio in September where we were presented sessions on technology, leadership, certification, parliamentary rules, and membership issues. Most of the meeting centered on how to remain a vital organization for all of the different age groups represented within our associations. The keynote speaker was Karl Bruhn, founder of the Music Making and Wellness Movement, who spoke about the importance of recreational music making for adult students, but also for those 2 out of 3 students who seem to quit formal lessons within the first 2 years of study, a sobering statistic indeed.

I would like to express my appreciation to President-Elect, Wanda Hall, our host chapter Tidewater Music Teachers Forum, and VCU for making our Fall Conference such a success. At the General Session of the 2004 Conference a motion was passed that all members who attend any events at the annual conference, including competitions, must register for the conference. Our conference competition costs are quite high and VMTA needs the revenue from all attendees in order to continue funding these state level events. MTNA has recognized this and, at their December board meeting, made this statement: "States may charge an additional fee for teachers with students in the competitions to help offset the cost of the state competitions." Following the conference I appointed a statewide committee to review the current VMTA Theory Syllabus and Tests along with a suggested Revised Syllabus in order to determine what, if any, official revisions and corrections should be made. The suggested revisions will be presented at the June 4th Business Conference in Charlottesville. It has been requested that the ear training tapes be revised and recorded onto CD-please contact Pauline Pompeii, State Theory Chair, if you would like to head up this project.

I will attend the Southern Division Competitions in Louisville, Kentucky at the end of January, and will represent Virginia at the MTNA Conference in Seattle, Washington in April. I hope to see many of you at the National Conference April 2–6. We will have a Virginia lunch during the conference—watch the VMTA web site www.music-usa.org/vmta for exact day, time and place.

We would like to submit a name for the MTNA Teacher of the Year award in 2005. An application form will be available on the website so that each chapter may nominate a member to be considered for VMTA Teacher of the Year. Those applications must be postmarked by May 2, 2005 so that the Executive Committee may review them before the June 4 meeting. VMTA also has a deadline of May 15 for Small Chapter Grant applications. ■

### DIRECTIONS:

**Coming from the East on I-64:** exit at the first Charlottesville exit, marked Charlottesville/Shadwell (exit 124). Turn right onto Rt. 250. Proceed through one stop light after you turn; at the second light, turn right (Pantops Mountain Road). There is a sign for "Westminster Canterbury of the Blue Ridge" on the highway, just beyond this stoplight.

**Coming from the West on I-64:** stay on until the last exit (Charlottesville/Shadwell) and follow directions above, except you would turn left at the bottom of the exit ramp onto Rt. 250 and go through 3 lights. (If coming from the Harrisonburg area, the easiest way would be to take I-81 to I-64 West and follow above directions).

**Coming from the South** on Rt. 29: take I-64 Exit towards Richmond, then exit at 124 (Charlottesville/Shadwell) and follow the directions for coming from the West.

**Coming from the North**: follow 29 South to the 250 By-pass exit East to Richmond. Continue about 5 to 6 miles until you cross the Rivanna River. Turn left at the 3rd light after the river.

**Once on Pantops Mountain Road,** proceed up the hill to the Gatehouse. Tell the guard on duty you are arriving for a meeting in the Rotunda Room. There are several possible parking places, as follows. Go over one speed bump, then look immediately to your left where you will see the entrance to a small parking lot. If there are no spots there, go over a second speed bump and you will see a large Visitor Parking Lot on your right. In both cases, walk back to the smaller lot and go through the Fountain Courtyard to the double doors at the back, which lead you directly into the foyer of the Rotunda Room.

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# **Certification Profile:** Carla Fosbre




**64 ()** m on a crusade to help parents and students see that music is really important in your life. I have a hard time with all the sports activities. Roanoke Valley is very big on sports. I'm trying to push music. There's life beyond sports. When you're 85 you won't be able to run a football but you can still play piano. If parents would back the children up in their musical

activities it would make all the difference. You can tell the ones that encourage their children to practice and do well in music and the ones who don't." Newly certified by the MTNA, Carla Fosbre credits her three great piano teachers, all VMTA members, with inspiring her to become a piano teacher herself. She began her study with Betty Ann Spiers, "so professional, a wonderful teacher who made me love music." After a long hiatus she returned to piano lessons at age 35 with Gret Kidd, who "was so professional and was great with adult students." Gret encouraged Carla to enroll at Hollins University to earn their piano teaching certificate. It was at Hollins that Carla studied with Dr. Michael Sitton, "a wonderful, down-to-earth person who is very

talented." She now set herself the goal of MTNA certification. Preparing for the pedagogy test looked overwhelming at first. Using the MTNA Study Guide Carla worked a little bit at a time in detail. Reviewing college notes was helpful, and she found her teaching experience invaluable in preparing for the test. There were no big surprises on it, and although she considers herself a slow test-taker she was able to write the various sections in considerable detail. At Carla's piano studio at the Valley Academy of Music she teaches 26 students, mostly elementary-age children along with two adults and some preschoolers. With her youngest students, ages 3, 4 and 5, she uses rote methods along with rhythm activities, singing and learning about composers. Even the youngest students participate in her Christmas recital at Roanoke College, playing little rote pieces. "I try to inspire each kid with a variety of genres, from classical to jazz." Twice a year Carla offers Musikgarten classes after school for the Roanoke County school system. The students in these six-week programs have an opportunity at PTA meetings to show what they have learned. "I plan to get more involved with MTNA," Carla concludes, "because it's a great organization with dedicated teachers."

The chair expressed appreciation for the good representation and the meeting was adjourned.  $\blacksquare$ 


### **FALL FESTIVAL 2004**

### CALL TO ORDER

The General Board meeting at the  $40^{th}$  Conference was called to order by President Kim Peachy at 3:10 p.m.

The motion was made and seconded to adopt the agenda; the motion passed.

The motion was made and seconded to approve the minutes of the June 2004 meeting as read; the motion carried.

#### REPORTS

**President Kim Peachy** thanked Wanda Hall for the current conference. She reported on the MTNA Summit in September. She announced that Virginia's activities would be published in the AMT magazine. She gave the report from the Executive Board on the status of Theory test revisions/corrections: all tests will remain the same for this year. She will form a statewide committee to revise them and the Executive Board will be forming a policy to deal with revisions. The request was made to put the Ear Training portion on a CD; this idea will be considered.

**President-Elect Wanda Hall** reported 92 members registered for the conference, an excellent attendance considering that the Pedagogy conference was the same weekend.

Membership Chair Denise Adkins reported that we have 710 regular members and 118 senior members for a total of 828 as of October 5.

**Treasurer Julie Slingerland** presented the budget as given to the Executive Board. (See the Executive Committee minutes for the copy.) She pointed out that our theme was to save money. She reviewed the various items listed and mentioned that we should make up some of our deficit each year. The proposed budget is somewhat inflated to cover possible expenses and projects, less the deficit. The **MOTION** was made by Tonya Menard, 2<sup>nd</sup> by Jeanette Winsor, to approve the budget as presented; the motion carried.

**Finance Committee** representative Martha Smith reported that we have \$12,500 invested in a money market and \$6000 in a CD. But higher yield accounts did not prove to be practical for now so the recommendation is to leave everything as it is for now and to review the status annually.

Certification Chair, Betsy Cole Wells, announced that two

candidates took tests today. Only one interested person came to the certification meeting but she hopes that more will apply.

**IMTF Chair Jeanne Jackson** reported a good attendance at the meeting Saturday morning. She asked if we had ever done a statewide policy survey and if there was any interest in doing one. She will check with Ginny Koun.

Chair of Local Associations, Gret Kidd, reported that 11 local chapters were represented at the luncheon and there was good sharing and good feedback.

#### STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

**STUDENT COMPOSITION COMPETITION** winners will not be announced yet since they won't be done until November 1. They will be invited to perform at the Spring meeting in Charlottesville.



The VMTA Certification Board arranged for and administered the Practical Teaching Examination to one candidate at the Fall Conference held at Virginia Commonwealth University, October 29–31, 2004. We are happy to announce that Carla Fosbre successfully passed the Practical Teaching Examination and is now a Nationally Certified Teacher of Music.

The Board also administered two proficiency exams at the Fall Conference. This is a first step for teachers seeking certification who need to fulfill the requirements for proficiency in areas such as Music History/Literature, Theory and Pedagogy.

The Certification session at the Conference, entitled "You've Got Questions? We've Got Answers!," was well attended and teachers interested in pursuing certification were able to have many of the questions they had answered by teachers with first hand experience, Sharon Stewart and Ann Bosch, as well as members of the Certification Board.

### IMTF



As the new state IMTF chair, I had the pleasure of leading the IMTF session at the Fall Convention. I posed the question, "What kind of teacher do you want to be?" to the participants. Note that this is different from asking what do you want to do. Those in attendance quickly rattled off a long list of about 20 adjectives including "creative," "energetic," "organized", "insightful," "empathetic." The next question then is how can we arrange our work setting, time, and policies to meet these professional ideals?

In *Etudes for a Piano Teacher*, Stewart Gordon writes that the "teaching of the art of music should be regarded as having at least equal status with the art of performing and it might even be argued that a career in teaching makes more lasting contributions to society than one centered only on performance." He also states our success as teachers, like that in other professions "should depend upon the ability to build a reputation for quality."

If we can agree that what we do is of value to society, we must also realize that the choices we make in operating our studios affect the value of what we have to offer. At a recent program given for the Charlottesville Music Teachers Association, Jim Moore, a business and real estate consultant and husband of VMTA Secretary Barbara Moore, stated that he thought music teachers were in general a bit "wimpy" when setting their fees. I would agree and offer that this attitude can also extend to other areas where studio finances are involved. For example, I asked the group at the IMTF session how to handle tuition for a student who would be absent for an extended illness (in this case mononucleosis) of about 2 months. Those who expressed their opinions openly felt quite hesitant to charge for the lessons. The

# **Technology Tidbits:** Interactive Musician (Educator's Version)

**I**nteractive Musician, a new program published by Alfred, has numerous levels for drill in three areas: Pitch Training, Sight-Reading, & Rhythm. The self-paced program can be customized which allows control of the content and difficulty. The pupil answers via the on-screen or external MIDI keyboard. The MIDI allows for faster input of answers which is necessary in the higher levels. Assessment tests with electronic scoring can be created for quick evaluation of a pupil's progress.

Pitch Training drills the pupil's ability to reproduce the single note, interval, melody, scale, or chord sounded by the MIDI. Sight-Reading presents 12 measures total in six 2-measure segments. Rhythm tests reading involving one or two hands, dictation, and customized one or two hand drills.

This program allows the pupil to practice three important skills essential to musicianship outside of the lesson in the music lab, the classroom and, especially, at home. Since the drills are random, the pupil can practice the same level repeatedly until he is ready to work on the next level. More drill on these three particular subjects is often needed and this program creates many opportunities for growth in these areas.

The program has an excellent Educator's User Guide supported by a comprehensively indexed Video Tutorial. This software is intuitive and easy to use.


student involved is my own and perhaps because I see college tuition looming ahead for my own children I was the only teacher in the group who was not inclined to make concessions. It turns out that the parent was fully prepared and expected to pay for the missed time since I had saved the space for her son. Coincidentally, the week after this student returned I had another student contract the same illness. Had I followed the advice of the group, my income would have taken quite a hit. Those of us who are well established in this profession need to be mindful of new teachers entering our ranks and the expenses they face as they work to set up shop.

For teachers interested in applying new paradigms to their studio practice, I highly recommend a new book. In *Too Soon Old, Too Late Smart: Thirty True Things You Need to Know Now,* Dr. Gordon Livingston applies a lifetime of experience from his psychiatry practice to life situations we all share and grapple with. In his essay titled The most secure prisons are the ones we construct for ourselves, he states, "Before we can be able to do anything, we must be able to imagine it." Imagining the inherent quality of what we do can transform our lives and help us reach our aspirations as teachers. ■

### **COMMISSIONED COMPOSER WINNER ANNOUNCED**

Congratulations to composer James Wiznerowicz of Charlottesville. He has been selected to receive the commission for a new work in the 2004–2005 Virginia Music Teachers Association/Music Teachers National Association Composer Commis-



James Wiznerowicz (\*1966) has received degrees from Eastern Michigan University (B.A., M.A.) and the University of Arizona (D.M.A.). His composition teachers have included Anthony Iannaccone, Ladislav Kiubik, and Daniel Asia. Recently, his music has been performed at festivals and conferences in Europe and the United States including the *La Roque d'Antheron* of France, the International Trumpet Guild Conference, and the Society of Composers, Inc. National Conference. He has had a broadcast of his *Aria for Solo Bassoon* and *Micrologus for Solo Flute* on the National Public Radio program *Theme and Variations*.

He was awarded a fellowship from the Virginia Center for Creative Arts for a two-week artist residency in 2003. His work Prelude and Allegro for Wind Symphony was among the finalists in the 2003 Penfield High School Composition Competition, and his ...as though colors poured... received first prize in the 2003 Contemporary Music Society. Prior to 2003 his work, ...trees rustling in silence, performed in France, Turkey, Brazil, and the United States, won first prize in the 8<sup>th</sup> International Saguaro Film Festival. A recent work for solo organ, Fandanguillo, has received performances in Connecticut, Atlanta, Georgia and Berlin for the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Fulbright program in Germany.

In addition to various fellowships and awards from the University of Arizona, he has won Standard Awards from ASCAP for three consecutive years (2002–04). Currently he is listed on the 2004–2008 Artist Roster for the Art-in-Education Residency program with the Commonwealth of Virginia and teaches at Virginia Commonwealth University in Richmond, Virginia. ■

### **SENIOR MTNA COMPETITIONS**

Virginia's Senior MTNA Competitions were held during the VMTA Convention, which was October 28–31, 2004, at Virginia Commonwealth University in Richmond, Virginia. This year, there were many participants in the areas of piano, woodwinds, and voice. (There also was a single participant in the string division, Jessica Kim, student of Natalia Yampolsky. Jessica automatically advanced, as the state representative.)

The Senior Woodwind Competition took place on Thursday, October 28. Flutist Kathleen Winters, student of Francile Bilyeu, was the winner. Clarinetist David Weigert, student of Ken Lee, was the alternate. Two Honorable Mentions were awarded: to flutist Amal Gochenour, student of Judith Lapple, and to clarinetist Mariko Yamaguchi, student of Ken Lee. The woodwind judges were Nancy Garlick (clarinet) of the University of Virginia, Alan Cox (flute) of the University of Virginia, and LaVerne Sargeant (flute) of Shenandoah Conservatory.

The Senior Voice Competition took place on Friday, October 29. Krista McClellan, student of Catherine Manley, was the winner, and soprano Erin Coffey, also a student of Catherine Manley, was the alternate. The voice judge was Cynthia Donnell of Virginia Commonwealth University.
