
If you are an independent music teacher not already nationally certified, seriously consider starting the process now, as school is starting and you are organizing your studio and setting teaching goals for the coming year.



Certification Profile: Elizabeth Blakeslee

A practice trophy competition in the month of May is Elizabeth Blakeslee's solution to the conundrum of needing students to be prepared for year-end recitals and auditions. While this activity could take place any month of the year, Ms. Blakeslee chooses May because it's such a busy time. Students report their practice in increments

of 500 minutes. For 500 minutes they receive a medal, and for 1,000 a small trophy. Increasingly larger trophies can be achieved for each additional 500 minutes. Each trophy is engraved with the actual number of minutes practiced.

Falls Church harpist Elizabeth Blakeslee taught at Shenandoah University for twelve years and had built up to ten students there when she left. She currently teaches three students at George Mason University in addition to the twenty-five preparatory students she has in her home studio. Second harpist in the National Symphony, Ms. Blakeslee previously held principal harp positions in the Richmond Symphony Orchestra and the Orquesta Sinfonica de Columbia in Bogata, and was guest principal harpist in the Kennedy Center Opera House Orchestra.

"Harp is a little esoteric, so I can't put my students in all the events that piano students are in. I have a whole technique curriculum with graded requirements—scales, arpeggios, chords,

trills, etc.—and I award belts in a series of nine colors culminating in black." In addition to the karate-style belts, students receive ribbons which they can tie to their harps. Ms. Blakeslee hires other harp teachers to evaluate her students.

"I mix things up. I have three recitals a year, in November, March and June. During the first trimester we have a focus on sight-reading. In the second trimester we focus on the belts and on chamber music. During the third trimester we work towards the recitals and competitions. As to competitions, I blow hot and cold on them. It's a great idea as long as the students don't take themselves too seriously."

At Auburn University Elizabeth Blakeslee studied with retired Metropolitan Opera harpist Marjorie Tyre. She did graduate work at Virginia Commonwealth University, studying harp with Philadelphia Orchestra harpist Marilyn Costello. In addition to her orchestral work she is busy with chamber music and recording. She has served on the boards of the American Harp Society and the Virginia String Teachers Association (VASTA) and was named VASTA Outstanding Studio Teachers of the Year in 2011. She served as President of NVMTA 2013–2014 and is on the MTNA Committee to name a local chapter of the year.

"I think certification is a wonderful program. I became certified to support the organization." ■

VMTA FALL FESTIVALS

It's time again for the Fall Festival! Encouraging your students to participate is a great way to get them off to a fast start this fall. In Northern Virginia, the festival will take

place Saturday, November 7, 2015. At Lynchburg and Richmond, the date of the festival is set as Saturday, November 14, 2015. In Roanoke, the festival will take place Saturday, November 21, 2015. The Winchester (Shenandoah) Fall Festival is still to be arranged. See below for the registration

postmark deadline and chairman for each location in addition to exact festival location. No late applications will be accepted.

You may enter students in piano, piano duet, organ, strings, woodwinds, brass, percussion, classical guitar, accordion, or voice. Students must play one piece from the Contemporary Period containing at least one contemporary idiom. The second piece must be chosen from any historical period other than the Contemporary Period. In certain localities, pieces which are traditionally composed (perhaps from a method book) are accepted for the non-Contemporary piece, but only for beginning students. Please check with your local Fall Festival Chairman concerning this. Both pieces must be memorized. There are only two exceptions to this rule: 1) students in Levels III or IV who

play an avant garde piece may use their music if this has been cleared by the local chairman prior to the registration deadline or 2) entries in piano duet or organ. No photocopied music is allowed. Only originally composed music is accepted, no simplifications or popular music.

Check the VMTA Yearbook under "General Regulations for All VMTA Events" and

"VMTA Fall Festivals," for further information and regulations. Also check page 3 of the VMTA Yearbook for the contact information of each chairman.

Festivals will be held in the following locations with these registration postmark deadlines and local chairmen:

Lynchburg (CVMTA): November 1; F. Johnson Scott, President; held at West-Lynchburg Baptist Church (tentative location).

Northern Virginia: October 6; Lori Santos and Virginia Moore, Chairmen; held at Cherrydale United Methodist Church, 3701 Lorcom Lane, Arlington, VA 22207.

Richmond: October 13; Lois Broadwater and Savannah Hatcher, Chairmen; held at the University of Richmond.

Roanoke: October 9; Bittsy Hall and Adele Carliss, Chairmen; held at Hollins University, Roanoke.

WINTERGREEN RESORT AN INSPIRING BACKDROP FOR SUMMER CONFERENCE

The VMTA Summer Conference took place at Wintergreen Resort in July with beautiful weather to match. In coordination with Wintergreen Performing Arts, both groups shared amazing performances and inspiring clinicians. One of the highlights was a concert featuring the winners of the VMTA Concerto Competition and the Wintergreen Festival Orchestra. The four students who played exceeded all expectations and elicited standing ovations from the appreciative audience. Here's a description of the musicians and their performances:

Roman Kasparian, 16 years old, has been taking piano lessons for about 10 years. His teacher is Ms. Margarita Gramaticova. Since 2007, he has been a frequent winner of piano competitions and participant in honors recitals in the Metro Washington area. Roman played the Grieg Piano Concerto in A Minor, Op. 16 with the Festival Orchestra.

Violinist Leyla Feyzulayeva was born in Uzbekistan, Tashkent, into a musical family. When Leyla was six, piano became her first instrument. She began violin lessons a year later with Irina Chupikova, who now teaches at Gnessin Russian Academy of Music. Leyla studied violin for twelve years at Uspensky Music School for Gifted Children. She then went to Interlochen Arts Academy for one year, studying violin with Yuri Namkung. After graduating from Interlochen Arts Academy, Leyla decided to go to Shenandoah University, as she

understood very soon after, a perfect place for her. Now Leyla is a rising senior at SU in the violin studio of Akemi Takayama. Leyla played the first movement from Nigun from Baal Shem by Ernst Bloch.

Jean Kim is an honor roll student at the Thomas Jefferson High School for Science and Technology and an oboist in the Peabody Youth Orchestra, Johns Hopkins University. Jean's teacher is Yeong Su Kim. Jean played the Oboe Concerto in E flat major by Vincenzo Bellini with the Festival Orchestra.

Carlos Figueroa is a young emerging cellist from city of Barquisimeto, Venezuela. Figueroa has worked with renowned conductor Maestro Gustavo Dudamel and the Simón Bolivar Symphony Orchestra and was a member of the Lara State Symphony Orchestra. Figueroa's primary teacher was the renowned cellist Maestro William Molina. In 2013, he arrived in Virginia to begin studies at the Shenandoah Conservatory of Music with Maestro Tom Shaw, long time cellist of the Audubon Quartet. Carlos played the 4th movement of the Cello Concerto in Eminor, Op. 85 by Edward Elgar.

Other highlights of the conference included the headliner speaker, Barry Green, author of The Inner Game of Music and Hal Leonard composer and arranger, Phillip Keveren. In spite of the excellent performances, clinicians and the mountain atmosphere, the 2015 conference will be the last to take place in the summer. Attendance decreased to 70 people in 2015 which wasn't enough to support the high cost of the venue. The VMTA Executive Board voted to hold future conferences in the fall in conjunction with the VMTA auditions and competitions.

Stay tuned for next year's conference to take place in the Fall of 2016. \blacksquare

VMTA GENERAL BUSINESS MEETING JULY 18, 2015, WINTERGREEN, VA

President Paulo Steinberg called the meeting to order at 8:40 a.m.

Agenda approved as written.

Minutes from July 19, 2014 Conference at Wintergreen Resort, VA were approved as revised.

Officers Reports:

President - Paulo Steinberg:

- This is a bitter-sweet report, as this is my last report as President. I am thankful for the experience and many great new friendships.
- Last September, Paulo attended a MTNA summit for leaders and met many great leaders. One of the leaders, Marc Hebda, Southern Division Director, is here with us this weekend.
- We had our second Presidents Summit this weekend where 20 leaders attended. We had an inspiring time together and discussed the future of VMTA.
- Paulo is proud to have been a representative of Virginia at the Southern Division Competitions in Knoxville, TN and the MTNA National Conference. At the Southern Division Competition, Virginia placed well with 6 winners and 4 honorable mentions. At the MTNA Competition we had a second place winner.
- There are a few months left before Susan Atkins takes over as President on December 1st. Thank you all for the opportunity to grow and thank you Susan for all that hard work you have done.

President Elect - Susan Atkins:

- It has been a very good year. The state competitions were held at Liberty University in this past fall. Liberty was a great place to have the competitions and they have a new performing arts center. This fall, the competitions will be at VCU on October 29-31, 2015. I encourage you to attend as it is a wonderful event and is great to see the students perform.
- Thank you for coming to the VMTA Conference and thank you for the support. Thank you to all who helped out at the event. Thank you to Laura Cardin for helping out with registration and thank you Paulo Steinberg for mentoring me.

VP Membership - Rebecca Wallenborn:

- Our 2014–2015 membership totals were: 675 active members, 153 senior members, 31 student members, which is a total membership of 859. This is a decrease of 11 from last year's total 870.
- VMTA ranks sixth in membership out of fifty states and D.C., and holds the largest state membership in the Southern Division which is represented by nine states.
- Each of us present here and in our respective chapters is an ambassador for VMTA.
- Becky shared with us an inspiration message written by MTNA Vice President and Membership Chair, Karen Thickstun. (Paraphrased below)

MTNA members are like summer music campers; there are three types of campers:

1. The shy camper—needs time to acclimate. Ask often and gently and let them find their time to come and join.

- 2. The outgoing camper—they can jump right in and do not have to be asked twice, but they need to be stimulated and challenged in order to stay engaged. As an organization we need to change, adapt and keep things fresh by being flexible and stimulation for professional development, education and socialization.
- 3. The follower—They are not obvious that they want to be asked, but they need to be asked. Listen and notice the subtle clues they may give. Do not overlook anyone or assume that they do not want to be a part of the organization.

Be willing to be a broken record when reaching out to potential members. As musicians and teachers, no one understands the value of repetition as we do. Also, remember your love of music and desire to learn.

Secretary – Laura Cardin: Nothing to report.

Treasurer - Mun Lee Han:

- As of June 30, 2015—Balance in Checking Account: \$17,505.06;
 Savings Account: \$22,025.56; CD: \$4,259.55.
- The budget was presented. All were in favor of the budget.
- The Executive Board has agreed to increase District Audition application fee from \$20 to \$25.

Certification - Diane Perett:

- We are 34th in the nation for certification and Diane would like to see us double the number of people who are certified for next year.
- This year, so far, we have six newly certified teachers.

Local Associations - Donna Halleck:

- On Thursday, we had our second, bi-annual Presidents Summit with 20 in attendance, 10 of our 12 chapters represented. The summit gives the local presidents a chance to discuss problems and suggestions to each other—the main issue is increasing membership. The summit also provides a great time to share great ideas that can be brought back to the individual chapters and presidents develop new friendships and comradery amongst peers.

Old Business:

Theory test update - Tonya Menard:

- 942 students participated in the theory test and the ranking results will be posted in *NewsNotes*.
- Year two tests have been created. Sample tests will be available to the Theory Chairmen in about two weeks.
- Grading on the tests will be changed to make easier to grade; totals will be out of 100 points.
- Added to the syllabus for level 9 or 10, identifying a period of an example. Which period uses the characteristic from Baroque, Classical, Romantic or 20th Century?
- The President announced that the VMTA Board agreed to allocate \$250 to Tonya Menard for the revisions.

New Business / Announcements

- VMTA State Auditions The Board decided to eliminate the requirement for length of study, with the same teacher.
- 2015 Conference Thank you Susan Atkins for your hard work this year.
- 2016 Conference The finances for the conference at Wintergreen have been high and the attendance has not been enough to compen-
