Certification Profile: Holly Rodgers, NCTM

Becoming certified in two different instruments means almost twice the work, Holly Rodgers learned when she applied for certification in both piano and flute. The best way to tackle it, she found, was to do the same project for both instruments before turning to the other projects. The musical analysis took the longest, partly because it involved the most writing. When it came time to record the

video she used one student for both piano and flute.

As a public school ESL teacher who also teaches private piano and flute lessons, her time was in short supply. Rodgers multitasked when possible—taking her projects with her and making use of down time. When it looked like time was running out she paid for an extension that enabled her to complete her application in 2015. "One reason I decided to become certified was that having credentials really distinguishes you as a teacher."

A self-styled "military brat," Holly Rodgers grew up in various localities but attended the same elementary school in Burke where she is now an ESL teacher. After graduating from Lake Braddock High School she earned a bachelor's degree in music education at LSU with piano her major instrument and flute her secondary. She took a job for two years as a band director in Texas, which has some of the best band programs in the country. For example, the school where she taught was in a poor neighborhood but had two band halls. When Rodgers decided to seek a school job in Virginia, it turned out to include work with a high school marching band plus class piano plus English as a second language. As the year went by she found the part she enjoyed the most was ESL, so she enrolled in master's work in multilingual/multicultural education, first at the University of Mary Washington and later at George Mason University. She is now licensed to teach Music, ESL and English Literature from pre-kindergarten through high school.

Currently two-thirds of Rodgers' music students are pianists and one-third flutists. They range from age seven to a senior who recently played her senior recital on piano, flute and cello. Rodgers herself "experiments" with cello and accompanied her student. As she notes, to receive her degree she had to be conversant with all the instruments.

"I am looking for students who are going to be music lovers for life, regardless of whether they do it for a profession. I want my students to enjoy what they play. I expose them to a wide range of music so they are well rounded. I try to make them happy so they are motivated to practice. I use analogies to help the students have a personal connection with what they are playing. With my horseback-riding student, for instance, I use riding analogies."

A member of the Springfield Music Club (NFMC) and MTNA, Holly Rodgers enters students in the Springfield Club's Sonatina Festival and Jazz Festival in addition to the Federation's Junior Festival and National Guild of Piano Teachers auditions.

What a good time it is <u>now</u> to pursue national certification, just as school is getting underway and you are organizing your studio and implementing teaching goals for the coming year! I hope many of you independent teachers or college faculty, who are not yet certified, will decide this is the time to get started.

There are no tests to take.

And VMTA offers a \$100 rebate of the application fee to any Virginia teacher who achieves certification.

The letters NCTM show the world outside VMTA that we music teachers are <u>professionals</u>, just as doctors and lawyers are professionals—that we aspire to and maintain high standards for ourselves in our teaching and that we are committed to lifelong learning. Completing the process of national certification leads even the best of teachers to a higher level of excellence. Don't we owe our students that excellence?

Please read the certification information on the MTNA website, as well as the articles about certification in each issue of the AMT.

College faculty members, submit your application to MTNA now, in order to receive the administrative verification form to be completed by your dean or supervisor.

Independent teachers, start work on one of the required teacher profile projects now, and submit your application either now or partway into the process, if you feel you may not be able to finish the five projects within a year. All but one of the projects can be completed before you ever officially submit your application for certification to MTNA, and that can buy busy teachers a little extra time.

Your local certification chair and I are happy to answer your questions, find mentors, and form study groups to help you earn your national certification.

VMTA FALL FESTIVALS

It's time again for the Fall Festival! Encouraging your students to participate is a great way to get them off to a fast start this fall. In Richmond, the Festival will take place Saturday, November 4, 2017. Northern Virginia's date is set as Saturday, November 11, 2017. In Roanoke, the Festival will be Saturday, November 18, 2017. The Winchester (Shenandoah) Fall Festival is still to be arranged. See below for the registration deadline and chairman for each location in addition to exact Festival location. No late applications will be accepted.

You may enter students in piano, piano duet, organ, strings, woodwinds, brass, percussion, classical guitar, accordion, or voice. Students must play one piece from the Contemporary Period containing at least one contemporary idiom. The second piece must be chosen from any historical period other than the Contemporary Period. In certain localities, pieces that are traditionally composed (perhaps from a method book) are accepted for the non-Contemporary piece, but only for beginning students. Please check with your local Fall Festival Chairman concerning this. Both pieces must be memorized. There are only two exceptions to this rule: 1) students in Levels III or IV who play an avant garde piece may use their music if this has been cleared by the local chairman prior to the registration deadline or 2) entries in piano duet or organ. No photocopied music is allowed. Only originally composed music is accepted, no simplifications or popular music.
